

WHAT IS CORRUPTION?

CORRUPTION IS THE ABUSE OF ENTRUSTED POWER FOR PRIVATE GAIN



EXAMPLES

- Actual money changing hands
- Demand for sexual favours
- Leak in exam questions
- Offer a job to a family member
- Promise of political support from powerful interest groups
- Cross-border transfer of stolen assets





THE NEGATIVE EFFECTS OF CORRUPTION



SOCIAL

Citizens compelled to pay for services that should be free.

Affects lives. Substandard quality of goods and services — for example, buildings collapse, killing innocent people, due to contracts being awarded to inefficient companies who paid bribes to win the contracts.

Undermines people's trust in the political system, in its institutions and its leadership. A distrustful public can then become yet another hurdle to challenging corruption.







SOLICIT OR RECEIVE BRIBE

Any person soliciting or receiving bribes as an inducement or reward in an official transaction.

s.16(a) and 17(a) MACC Act 2009



OFFER OR GIVE BRIBE

Any person offering or giving bribes to public or private sector officials in an official transaction.

s.16(b) and 17(b) MACC Act 2009





FALSE CLAIM

Any person submitting false claims in payment requisitions.

s.18 MACC Act 2009



ABUSE OF PUBLIC OFFICE

Abuse of office or position by a public official in making decisions for purposes of self interest.

s.23 MACC Act 2009

PENALTY



IMPRISONMENT AND FINE

Imprisonment: Up to 20 years, and Fine: RM10,000/- or 5 times the bribe amount; whichever is higher.

s.24 MACC Act 2009

WHO IS A WHISTLEBLOWER?

A person who discloses improper conduct (i.e. conduct which constitutes a disciplinary offence or a criminal offence) to an enforcement agency.

TYPE OF PROTECTION GIVEN TO WHISTLEBLOWERS

- Identity of whistleblower is kept confidential
- Information given by whistleblower is kept confidential
- Whistleblower given immunity from civil and criminal action and no disciplinary action will be taken
- Whistleblower will be protected against detrimental action such as intimidation, harassment, interference with lawful employment, action which causes injury, loss or damage
- Protection also granted to family members, relatives, friends and close associates of the whistleblower

Whistleblower Protection Act 2010

LODGING A REPORT WITH

INFORMATION NEEDED TO MAKE A REPORT

- Details of person(s) involved.
- Date, time and location of the incident.
- · Reasons for the transaction.
- Transaction amount and type.
- Identity of other witnesses (at the scene or having information), if any.
- Any document, information or physical evidence relating to the incident.

CORRUPTION DATA






CPI is an index that reflects the perceived level of public sector corruption among the 175 countries.

CORRUPTION PERCEPTIONS INDEX




The Malaysian Corruption Barometer is a survey tracking the Malaysian public's perception on corruption.

LEGAL FRAMEWORK

Established the Malaysian Anti - Corruption Commission (MACC) on 1 January 2009 to prevent corruption.

Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission Act 2009

Protection given to whistleblowers who disclose improper conduct to enforcement agencies.

Whistleblower Protection Act 2010

Established the Enforcement Agency Integrity Commission to address the misconduct of officers of 21 enforcement agencies. The agencies include the Immigration Department, Royal Malaysian Customs, Registration Department, Department for the Protection of Wild Life and Taman Negara, Labour Department and the Royal Malaysian Police.

Enforcement Agency Integrity Commission Act 2009

Protection given to witnesses for their safety and welfare for disclosing information regarding the commission of an offence based on a "threat assessment".

Witness Protection Act 2009

OTHER INITIATIVES

- Compliance Unit establised in key enforcement agencies, for eg. MACC, the Police, the Road Transport Department, the Customs Department and the Immigration Department.
- Established 14 specialised anti-corruption courts where the judges have been instructed to dispose corruption cases within 1 year of trial.
- Disclosure of information on procurement of government contracts on the MyProcurement portal

• The Special Committee on Corruption consisting of 7 members from the Houses of Parliament and advises the Prime Minister on the corruption problems in Malaysia.

• The Complaints Committee consisting of not more than 5 members appointed by the Minister to monitor the handling of complaints of misconduct of the officers of MACC.

s.15, MACC Act

FAQs

1 What kind of environment does corruption thrive in?

Corruption thrives where temptation meets permissiveness: where institutional checks on power are missing, where decision making is opaque, where civil society is disempowered. It is therefore important to establish control mechanisms and systemic hurdles to prevent people from abusing their power.

2 What is transparency?

Transparency is about shedding light on rules, plans, processes and actions. It is knowing why, how, what, and how much. Transparency ensures that public officials, civil servants, managers, board members and businessmen act visibly and understandably, and report on their activities. And it means that the general public can hold them to account. It is the surest way of guarding against corruption, and helps increase trust in the people and institutions on which our future depend.

3 How can you measure corruption?

Given that bribes occur illicitly and secretively, a specific figure can only ever be approximate. Research has shown us that people's perceptions offer a reliable estimate of the nature and scope of corruption in a given country. The perceptions of country analysts, business people or the general public form the basis of corruption indices such as the Corruption Perceptions Index and the Global Corruption Barometer.

4 Where can you report corruption and any avenue for appeal?

Report to MACC using any of its channels for reporting corruption. Other avenues that can assist are: the Public Complaints Bureau in the Prime Minister's Department which has been established to manage public complaints within 15 days or the Enforcement Agency Integrity Commission which deals with the misconduct of 21 enforcement agencies.

5 What are TI-M's recommendations to reduce corruption?

- Stronger political will must be shown.
- Declaration of assets for public officers and politicians.
- Comprehensive regulation on political financing including being transparent in how they receive and spend political donations.
- Establish a public registry of beneficial owners information for all companies to uncover the real owners.
- Establish a global platform that allows the government and civil society to work hand in hand towards national transformation.
- Contracts should be awarded through open tender and competitive bidding.
- Establish a multi-disciplinary task force by Auditor General Department to work with the Ministries with intervention powers.
- Spearhead an ASEAN Anti-Corruption Action Plan to maintain growth, financial stability, investment and trade and reduce poverty and income inequality.
