PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Civil society organizations and advocates of anti-corruption and good governance were pleasantly surprised last month when the Madani government announced that it is going to form a task force to get Malaysia to be among the top 25 countries in the Corruption Perception Index by 2033. This task force will oversee six focus group led by different agencies covering enforcement, managing public funds, business productivity, investment risks, legislation and strategic communication. Each of these focus groups have been assigned to look at the survey reports and analyse what needs to be done in terms of reforms and executing the strategic plan in the National Anti -Corruption Strategy (NACS). TI-Malaysia is deeply concerned about the execution of the respective strategies and its sub-strategies by the agencies. Since the NACS was launched not a single agency or ministry have come up with an operational plan or a tactical plan to explain how they plan to execute. It appears that the task force will be facing an uphill battle to force the changes and convince the civil servants to embrace the change, improve efficiency and practice good governance.

The string of arrests made by MACC especially on enforcement units such as the Immigration Department is a worrying trend on the behaviour and values among our civil servants. This is despite many previous incidents and several control measures being put in place in government agencies. What is wrong with Malaysians today? Are we not concerned about the future of the nation? Or are we not fearful that what we do is always watched by a supreme being? What happened to all the good values our parents have taught us or the religious teachings given to us regardless of whatever faith we are? It is timely for all religious groups to leverage on religion as a source of moral guidance and ethical values. All religions share a common belief that corruption is a sin and a transgression against the Divine Will.

Recently TI-Malaysia launched a new book "The Sin of Corruption -A Religious Perspective". The event was graced by the Chief Commissioner of MACC, Tan Sri Azam Baki at the Putra Jaya International Convention Centre. We embarked on this project by gathering religious scholars and researchers to write a chapter on corruption from a religious perspective of Islam, Buddhism, Christianity, Hinduism, Sikhism and Taoism. Religious organizations should play their part by spreading the message than indulging in corruption is a sin which God detests. On other projects mostly on business integrity we have engaged actively with state government of Sarawak through their integrity and ombudsman unit. This includes training on corporate liability and beneficial ownership for the CEIOs (Certified Chief Integrity Officers) and State Assemblyman (ADUNS). We also embarked on a new project called "Enhancing Transparency and Mitigating Corruption Risks in Carbon Markets for Climate Action" which is a study on climate governance integrity programme in the state of Sabah and Selangor. This project is funded by Waverly Street Foundation through our secretariat in Rerlin

The Malaysian National Anti-Corruption Strategy 2024-2028 ("the NACS") formulated 5 key strategies in the fight against corruption namely 1. Education 2. Public Accountability 3. Voice 4. Enforcement and 5. Incentives. In our country's battle against corruption, one of the most powerful, yet often underutilized, resources is youth.

The NACS has taken cognition of this and the Education strategy has called for the enhancement and strengthening of activities and curriculum on ethics, good values and anti-corruption at pre-school, primary, secondary school levels and institutions of higher learning including technical and vocational institutes.

Young people represent more than just the future; they are a potent force for change in the present. Their energy, innovative thinking, and passion for social justice make them ideal advocates in the fight against corruption. Engaging youth in anti-corruption efforts is crucial for shaping a future where integrity, accountability, and transparency are the foundation of society.



Corruption corrodes societies at every level, perpetuating inequality, stifling economic growth, and undermining trust in institutions. The engagement of young people in anti-corruption efforts can be a game changer for several reasons.

i. A Fresh, Innovative Perspective

Young people are inherently creative and unburdened by the limitations of "how things have always been done." They bring new ideas and fresh perspective that can disrupt the status quo and inspire innovative strategies to combat bribery and misuse of power.

ii. Technological Savvy

Whether it's building blockchain-based systems for secure and transparent transactions, using data analytics to monitor government procurement, or creating platforms that allow citizens to report corruption anonymously, the youth can deploy tech-driven innovations to enhance accountability.

Social media, too, plays a pivotal role in anti-corruption advocacy, and young people can mobilize large audiences, spread awareness, and foster nationwide movements to demand integrity from governments and corporations.

iii. Passion for Social Justice

One of the defining characteristics of today's youth is their deep commitment to social justice. Their passion for a more just and equitable world makes them natural allies in the fight against corruption. Their youthful energy can be harnessed in the fight against corruption, driving a cultural shift toward greater accountability and integrity in both the public and private sectors.

This book explores the view of corruption as a sin across six different religions: Islam, Christianity, Buddhism, Hinduism, Sikhism, and Taoism. It took two years for the authors, editors, and production team to complete this work, and it is now finally launched.







CLIMATE GOVERNANCE INTEGRITY PROJECT (CGIP)

MALAYSIA'S VOLUNTARY CARBON MARKET (VCM): ARE THERE GAPS LEADING TO CORRUPTION AND BAD SOCIAL OUTCOMES?









On 14 June 2024, Mr Ho Yi Jian presented a talk on Malaysia's voluntary Carbon Market (VCM) as part of his research effort for TI-Malaysia's Climate Governance Integrity Project (CGIP) at Sunway University. Mr Ho Yi Jian is our lead researcher for this CGIP project, funded by the Waverley Street Foundation. The session focused on the following points:

- The potential risks associated with a nascent VCM, including leakage, fraud, and negative social impacts
- Best practices for ensuring integrity and social impact based on international reports and case studies
- Gaps in existing guidelines for the Malaysian VCM



INTERNATIONAL ANTI-CORRUPTION CONFERENCE (IACC) IN VILNIUS LITHUANIA

Future Proofing Business: The Integrity Advantage of ESG



Dr Muhammad Mohan participated in the International Anti-Corruption Conference (IACC) in Vilnius, Lithuania from 18 until 21 June 2024. He was invited as a speaker for a session on **Future Proofing Business: The Integrity Advantage of ESG**.

The discussion highlighted on fostering a strong culture of integrity through key elements such as diversity, ethical leadership, and risk management, while highlighting the impact of geopolitical tensions, particularly between the US and China, on supply chain risks, corruption, and human capital. The UN Global Compact's Transformational Governance principles were emphasized as a framework for ethical business practices, including the integration of ESG. Concerns about Al's role in business integrity, such as data privacy and biases, were raised, along with challenges in ESG reporting due to differing standards across organizations, highlighting the need for a global standard.

During the meeting, we discussed the current state of corruption in Malaysia and its ranking in the Corruption Perception Index. We also had the opportunity to present our book, 'The Sin of Corruption: A Religious Perspective,' to them. It was indeed an engaging session and we hope to further strengthen the partnership between Transparency International Malaysia and Top Glove through various collaborations!



COLLECTIVE ACTION UPDATE

(JULY 2024)



The Collective Action report for Marang was submitted to Majlis Daerah Marang (MDM) on 1st July 2024. This meeting was attended by the Yang DiPertua Tuan Haji Lukema Meri Bin Salleh @ Abdul Latif, Encik Mohd Yusof Bin Salleh (Secretary), MDM officers, and representatives from the Monitoring Teams.





Among the results shared were: Fix-Rate data calculated before and during the 4-month monitoring period, results of the pre-and post-perception survey conducted with sample residents from the three zones, and additional pre- and post-survey comparisons by gender, age, academic qualification, and workplace (public or private). The 6-month extension to the monitoring period will end in August 2024. MDM expressed their satisfaction with the overall results and value of the program to the residents in the three pilot zones.



COLLECTIVE ACTION

State Governance Meeting/Mesyuarat Tatakelola Negeri (MTKN)



The Collective Action report for Marang was also submitted to MTKN #2, 2024, on 8th July 2024, which is the Terengganu state-level meeting to discuss matters related to governance and integrity. The State Secretary chaired the meeting, and representatives from state agencies, including MACC, attended. The Marang results, including the Fix-Rate and pre- and post-perception surveys, were shared at the meeting. The meeting also saw a live demonstration of the PowerBI Dashboard, highlighting the issues reported and the current status. In addition, a short video showed feedback from selected program participants. The State Secretary noted the results of the Collective Action pilot program and recorded his appreciation for its completion. The YDPs of Dungun and Marang were invited to give feedback on the program in their respective districts. YDP Dungun noted the strong involvement of the local community in the three zones (A, C, and D) and looked forward to expanding the Collective Action program to other zones. YDP Marang stated that the program positively impacted zones A, C, and E communities.



Climate Governance Integrity Project (CGIP) on Voluntary Carbon
Market in Malaysia



Transparency International Malaysia organized a half-day Roundtable on Integrity in the Emerging Voluntary Carbon Markets in Malaysia on 19 August 2024 at Crystal Crown Hotel, Petaling Jaya. This session is a part of our ongoing Climate Governance Integrity Project, led by our Lead Researcher, Mr Ho Yi Jian. The project focuses on assessing corruption risks and Gender Equality and Social Inclusion (GESI) impacts of evolving emissions trading schemes in Malaysia, particularly emphasizing the newly launched Voluntary Carbon Market (VCM) by Bursa Malaysia in 2023.

COURTESY VISIT BY THE ANTI-BRIBERY COMMITTEE JAPAN (ABCJ)



Transparency International Malaysia (TI-M) was honored to host the Anti-Bribery Committee Japan (ABCJ) for an engaging discussion on the state of corruption in Malaysia. Japan, ranked 16th globally with an impressive score of 73 on the Corruption Perception Index (CPI), is actively studying anti-corruption efforts across ASEAN. During their fact-finding mission, the ABCJ delegation sought to understand how organizations in the region tackle corruption locally.

We shared TI-M's role as an independent body driving legal reforms and combating corruption in Malaysia, highlighting our work and impact over the years. The exchange sparked meaningful dialogue on how the missions of TI-M and ABCJ align, opening up opportunities for collaboration in the fight for transparency and integrity.

COLLECTIVE ACTION WORKSHOP IN BANGKOK



On August 29, 2024, Alan Kirupakaran represented Transparency International Malaysia at a Collective Action Workshop in Bangkok, co-organized by the OECD and Basel Institute of Governance. The workshop's objective was to build on the previous Asia Pacific Collective Action forum held in 2023 and share experiences on the various Collective Action (CA) models currently being implemented in the region. Highlights included Thailand's use of Integrity Pacts to enhance project transparency, resulting in \$77 million in savings, and Hong Kong's ICAC approach, which combines awards, financial incentives, and robust public-private partnerships to promote integrity in the private sector.

The discussions also emphasized key strategies for engaging SMEs, such as providing accessible anti-corruption tools and proactive outreach through gatekeepers. As Malaysia prepares for its ASEAN chairmanship in 2025, there is a push to include Collective Action in regional initiatives. Upcoming events, including an OECD workshop in Bhutan and a Basel webinar on CA e-learning tools, will continue to support these efforts.


Civil society organisations (CSOs) welcomed with some reservations the launch of Malaysia's National Anti-Corruption Strategy 2024-2028 (NACS) last month by Prime Minister Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim. The NACS is an extension or continuation of the National Anti-Corruption Plan 2019-2023 (NACP), the nation's first ever comprehensive anti-corruption framework.

The NACP had 115 initiatives to be implemented over a five-year period. Despite the pandemic and rocky period that followed, from 2020 onwards, the NACP reportedly achieved an amazing 77% of its deliverables.

The NACS document briefly laid out several factors that contributed to the delay in completing the other initiatives. The process of trying to amend the constitution without a two-thirds majority by all the governments in the last five years was a major setback in achieving the NACP's target. CSOs would definitely support the detailed publication to parliament that 77% of the deliverables have indeed been completed, or even a confirmation by the Auditor-General's Office of the claim made.

The NACS explains that corruption practices manifest because of various underlying factors. Administrative failure, deficient internal controls, non-compliance with regulations, conflict of interest, inadequacies within law enforcement agencies and insufficient anti-corruption measures are the primary causes. This is based on the Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission's (MACC) findings in 2024. Even more shocking, MACC chief commissioner Tan Sri Azam Baki disclosed that on a macroeconomic scale, the detrimental impact of corruption in Malaysia is profound, culminating in losses amounting to a staggering RM277 billion in economic output from 2019 to 2023. This figure is equivalent to the gross domestic product of Johor and Penang combined.

One of the key elements for the success of action plans and strategies for governments, regional cooperation groups, CSOs and international organisations around the world is that all deliverables ought to be Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic and Timely, or SMART. While the NACS broadly documents the strategies that the government wants to achieve in the short, medium and long term, these deliverables have to be transparently monitored with measurable outputs over a specified period of time.



We urge the National Governance Planning Division of the MACC to collaborate with the relevant government agencies, institutions and CSOs on each of the 60 strategies, to put up a publicly accessible dashboard with quantifiable baselines, targets and milestones that are reviewed on a fixed periodic basis, with links to the completed activities, roadblocks and reports.

It is only when the progress is transparent and accessible, and seen by all of society that public perception of the government's commitment to eradicating corruption will improve, resulting in a positive impact on the nation's Corruption Perceptions Index in the long term. The prime minister has set an ambitious target of achieving a global ranking of 25 by 2033.

That requires Malaysia to score about 68–70 points out of 100. As at 2023, our score is 50 points and our global rank is 53. It is crucial to have government stability, consistent policies, acceleration of institutional reforms and the political will to fight corruption if Malaysia wants to achieve the target within the next 10 years. For the past 12 years, we have been struggling to maintain our scores above 50 (see chart) and the reason for this is the failure of the political leadership to have clear affirmative strategies and action plans to accelerate law reforms on public procurement and political financing, strengthen whistleblower protection, ensure the independence of MACC, parliamentary reforms and a separation of powers between the attorney general and public prosecutor.

In the interest of independence and transparency, it is vital that the agencies responsible for the deliverables under each strategy should not be the sole party monitoring or reporting on their progress. This task should be shared with external and independent parties such as CSOs, community-based organisations, the Bar Council and academics. This will ensure that no stone is left unturned in ensuring the integrity of deliverables. It will also prevent any allegations by critics that the deliverables are a mere box-ticking exercise.

Notwithstanding the encouraging show of commitment by the Madani government towards the anti-corruption initiative with the launch of the NACS, CSOs remain concerned with some of the changes observed between the NACP and NACS.



There remain some perceived gaps that raise serious concerns. One key area is the removal of the separation of powers of the attorney general and the public prosecutor under NACP initiative 4.1.2. This separation of powers has been studied by various government committees since 2018, with none of the reports made publicly accessible. Two years into the Madani government's tenure, there has yet to be a timeline provided to the rakyat on the separation, and now this initiative is glaringly absent from the NACS.

Another key area is NACP initiative 1.2.7, on the introduction of term limits for the prime minister, chief minister and menteri besar.

A timeline, road map and clear explanations to the rakyat on the next step forward is necessary. Unwarranted delays in such and other key reforms affect the confidence of the rakyat. Foreign investors would also need to be confident about the country's stability and good governance. The public coffers and the stability of the government could be hurt if the same "secrecy models" are used. Key to this is the announcement of an Access to Information Law that is expected to be conceived much earlier than expected.

A corruption-free Malaysia remains a pipe dream, and we can only work towards this goal with a collective action approach involving government, business and civil society. The setting up of various caucuses between civil society groups and business chambers would be an important stepping stone towards a more open, accountable government.

Together we will achieve a nation without corruption, a society with integrity.
